I want to take this opportunity to thank you for all your warm Christmas greetings and gifts and for the food that you brought while Brian and I were sick. I have never missed a holiday at church, so it was very difficult for me to not be able to celebrate with you.

It's difficult to believe but Lent is already upon us. Ash Wednesday is February 14th. We will have worship at 7:00 p.m. The imposition of ashes, and communion will be part of the service. Lent and Easter are probably my favorite holiday seasons. Though Christmas is a time to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. This series will come to its conclusion on Easter with the reminder that there is hope for all of us in the Remedy for Sin, who is Jesus Christ. Please invite your family and friends to join us.

Remember, you can join us in person or on Facebook throughout Lent to see how we can seek to be more like Jesus and be more aware of our sins.

CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT DECEMBER 2023

The monthly meeting of the Church Council was held December 20, 2023. This report is submitted to communicate to our congregation the work of the Council. By way of background, the Council serves as the Administrative Board, Trustees, Finance and Staff Parish Relations Committees in a governance and oversight role over all ministries. Church Council meetings are open meetings except when the Council deals with Staff Parish Relations matters.

The following are the major items from the Council's agenda discussed at the December meeting:

- For our spiritual development we discussed chapter thirteen in the book "Autopsy of a Deceased Church – 12 Ways to Keep Yours Alive" by Thom Rainer. We will identify those ways to stay healthy and alive. The prayer commitment for Chapter Thirteen, *My Church Is Very Sick: Four Responses*, was the following: *I believe all things are possible through you, God. Show me what I need to do to lead my church from hopeless to hope. And give me the courage and strength to make those changes, even those changes that will be very painful.* We encourage the congregation to also consider this prayer and the challenge it poses for us.
- We welcomed Lynne Girardi, Lee Ann Ditty and Ann Allison as guests. They will be the new members of the Council in 2024.
- Approved November Council meeting minutes.
- Reviewed November Council newsletter report.
- As we do every meeting, we reviewed the monthly financial report and balance sheet. After eleven months of the year we are running a deficit of \$10,557.26. The deficit would be larger were it not for the fact we take income from our investment account. We will continue to monitor this as it may impact ministries. We encourage the congregation to consider our response to the membership vow to support the ministries of the congregation through our prayers, presence, witness, service and gifts. To address this need, last month Council authorized a special mailing to the congregation to encourage a year end gift to enable us to catch up. To date we have received \$15,605.00. Council thanks the congregation for our generosity.
- Heard from the maintenance team that Fellowship Hall floor has been refinished and we continue to troubleshoot some of the HVAC units in classrooms.
- Noted that Kris Michael has withdrawn her letter of resignation as secretary/treasurer and has returned to this position. Council approved reinstating the pension. We have not had any applicants for the vocal choir director position.
- The Saint John's School of the Arts has moved all of their equipment to their new location. Lessons will end at our campus by the end of the year and all classes will be held at their new location after the first of the year.
- Cleaned up the balance sheet by consolidating similar funds and moving some of the monies to the general budget.
- The Congregational Care Team continues to explore fellowship opportunities for the congregation. They have events lined up for the next six months.
- Reviewed the process for selection of our monthly mission projects for 2024. We will receive suggestions in early February, vote in late February, and announce the projects in March. Council decided the January Mission project will be the We Care Fund and February Mission project will be Hope Made Real.
- Approved holding a year end review meeting in February of 2024 to invite the congregation to have dialogue with Council and ask any questions.
- Discussed Council leadership transition. Council will select new leadership in January.
- Presented certificates of appreciation to Erin Kuriga and Jan Walters for their service on Council.

CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT JANUARY 2024

The monthly meeting of the Church Council was held January 17, 2024. This report is submitted to communicate to our congregation the work of the Council. By way of background, the Council serves as the Administrative Board, Trustees, Finance and Staff Parish Relations Committees in a governance and oversight role over all ministries. Church Council meetings are open meetings except when the Council deals with Staff Parish Relations matters.

The following are the major items from the Council's agenda discussed at the January meeting:

- We completed our spiritual development study in December. Five books were brought to the meeting to choose a new study book. The books are Renovate or Die by Bob Farr, The Adept Church by F. Douglas Pone, Rich Church Poor Church by J Clif Christopher, Not Your Parents Offering Plate by J Clif Christopher, and Prayer: The Timeless Secret of High-Impact Leaders by Dave Early.
- We welcomed new members Lynne Girardi, Ann Allison, and Pat Burkett. Lee Ann Ditty was excused.
- Approved December Council meeting minutes.
- Reviewed December Council newsletter report.
- The council read and signed the leadership covenant for 2024.
- As we do every meeting, we reviewed the monthly financial report and balance sheet. After twelve months of the year (2023) we ran a deficit of \$3,778.39. The deficit would be larger were it not for the fact we take income from our investment account. We will continue to monitor this as it may impact ministries. We encouraged the congregation to consider their response to the membership vow to support the ministries of the congregation through our prayers, presence, witness, service and gifts. The congregation responded with \$16,704.00. The Council thanks the congregation for their generosity.
- Heard from the maintenance team that we continue to troubleshoot some of the HVAC units in classrooms. Heating is a time sensitive issue, so the council took action to authorize the maintenance team to approve any contract that needs immediate response up to and including \$2,000. Anything over \$2,000 needs to be discussed with the council or if it's time sensitive with the Council Chair who will respond with an email to the council.
- The Safety and security team was made aware of fire blankets in the event of a kitchen fire. One is installed on the wall across from the stove. The blankets are one time use. Bob Burns would like to hold Active Shooter training in the future.
- We are still looking for people to volunteer to run media, sound, and live streaming. Training is available.
- The Saint John's School of the Arts has returned all keys. Joyce has deactivated all SOTA key cards.
- Received information from Woodland's Bank about interest on endowment.
- The Congregational Care Team continues to explore fellowship opportunities for the congregation. The team is looking for new members and ideas for both the congregation and outreach events.
- Reviewed the process for selection of our monthly mission projects for 2024. We will receive suggestions in early February, vote in late February, and announce the projects in March. Council decided the January Mission project will be the We Care Fund and February Mission project will be Hope Made Real.
- The Council Town Hall meeting will be held Sunday, February 18 at 7:30 p.m.
- Lenten Breakfast with devotions will begin Saturday, February 17 at 8:00 a.m.
- Council elected the following officers and backup learners: Council Chair - Elaine Hinston; Vice-Chair TBD; Trustee Chair – Bob Burns, back up – Mark Ertel; SPRC Liaison – Cathy Prowant, back up – Ed Souter, Sr.; Secretary – Nancy Jacobs, back up - TBD
- Reviewed meeting dates and monthly devotional leaders.
- At the Church Conference the question was posed whether it was a conflict of interest for someone on the Finance Team to also do the audit. After some research it was agreed that because the Finance Team is strictly advisory with no voting rights, anyone on the team may do the audit. There would be no conflict of interest.
- The Council was notified that Mark and Lydia Ertel will be leading the usher teams.

Williamsport Area

- **North Central Sight Services**: a local non-profit agency that provides blindness prevention education, vision screening, and services and employment to individuals who are blind or visually impaired in the surrounding communities of several local counties.
- **Greater Lycoming Habitat for Humanity**: a non-profit, ecumenical Christian ministry founded on the principle that every man, woman and child should have a decent, safe, and affordable place to live
- **Gatehouse Hospice**: housed in the former Divine Providence Hospital, the Gatehouse is a place for those individuals and families facing terminal illnesses
- **School of the Arts**: the purpose of this ministry is to offer the children, youth and adults of the Greater Williamsport area a school devoted to excellent training in music and fine arts, in an atmosphere and environment supporting the Christian ethic
- **United Churches of Lycoming County**: offerings would go to help support the general fund of the United Churches Ministry, a ministry which unites all churches in the Williamsport area in common ministries and concerns
- **Expectations Women’s Center**: a team made up of staff members and trained volunteers who are there to help you navigate everything from relationships to pregnancy decisions to parenting.
- **24 Hour Food Pantry of Saint John’s-Newberry**: an outdoor food cabinet accessible 24 hours a day, to provide food to those in need in the community.

- **Neighborhood Center**: an inner-city Harrisburg ministry sponsored by our Susquehanna Annual Conference of the U.M. Church; much of its ministry involves providing a safe place and learning environment for at-risk children and youth.

- Support Homeless Vets: a Pennsylvania-founded mission to combat the growing epidemic of homeless vets, bringing quality of life to these forgotten heroes
- Wise Option for Women: sponsored by the YWCA of Northcentral PA, this crisis mission offers victims and survivors of domestic violence and/or abuse a safe haven and a place of support, 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year.

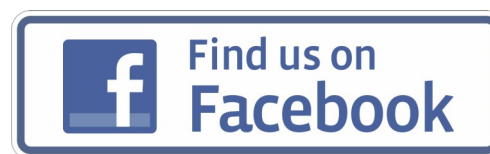
